## Pastor's Corner

We were delighted to host the community Easter service this year. We appreciate Ted Schultz providing the message. At our 10:00 a.m. service we received seven new members into the life of the church.

On Tuesday after Easter week our United Methodist Men hosted the District Men's Rally where we fed 145 folks and heard a good message challenging us to become mentors for others in our community.

I want to thank John Ally, Roger Davis, Steve Ruminski and Graham Witt for preparing the food. Other fellows came to park cars and clean up.

On Friday of this week we hosted 89 members of the Dayton alumni of Shenandoah University. At that meeting some 25 people were inducted into the hall of fame. Our own Anne Hill was one of those.

On Saturday the Rockingham Nurses Association had their annual banquet here at Dayton.

One out of ten people in Virginia need to obtain their food through food pantries like those in our county. The Volunteer

Farm has donated more than 300 tons of fresh, nutritious food for the hungry in their 10 year of existence. Our youth group has been helping out several years now. Our Youth group will travel to Woodstock and work on the Volunteer Farm this Saturday leaving at 7:00 a.m. and returning in the early afternoon.

Youth Sunday and Potato bar are this Sunday May 4<sup>th</sup>. All donations for the Potato bar go to help with the youth and their expenses for their mission trip to Atlanta.

On Monday May 5<sup>th</sup> we host the Habitat For Humanity banquet. A wonderful ministry that provides homes for people.

On May 18<sup>th</sup> we will host the Pence Middle School music program. Because there will be so many youth and their parents here for the worship service, we will be meeting in the Fellowship Hall at 10:00 a.m.

I like what Brennan Manning said one time. He said when we are aware of the love that God has for us, we become spontaneously grateful. Cries of thankfulness become the dominant characteristic of the interior life, and the byproduct of gratitude is joy. We are not joyful and then become grateful—we are grateful, and that makes us joyful.

## Thank you, from the Salvation Army

Wow, what an amazing year for **The Salvation Army’s Christmas** Fundraising effort! It was a record breaking year. We are grateful to you and your group for making this year possible. Please express all our thankfulness for your time on the kettles, coupled with a wonderfully generous community brought forth breathtaking results.

This past summer we knew 2013 would be a challenge. Four days of poor weather impacted both Toy convoy and kettles. Going into the last Saturday we were running **2.5 days behind last year’s effort.**

Then something amazing happened. At the last moment, just as with Toy Convoy and Angel Tree, **the community’s generosity poured** forth. December 23rd and 24th set

a two day historic high, the best tow days over our 89 years in Harrisonburg. Christmas Eve surpassed the prior single day record by over 25%, resulting in the kettles raising \$169,006. As Captain Duane Burleigh has expressed **it, “The Salvation Army didn’t do this. This is the community’s and Christ’s victory for those we serve.”**

Your labor of love made this record year possible. We value the time your group gave to staffing the kettles, greeting neighbors, wishing them well and thanking them for their generosity. Though we measure our kettles by dollars raised, the kettles are about helping people. The kettles provide you, me and our neighbors with the opportunity to express their

concern and good will toward their neighbors in need. The kettles are about the war on poverty...feeding hungry people, warm coats, providing children, disabled and other families who need a hand up, toys for children at Christmas, and music lessons and character building opportunities for youth whose families are caught in poverty.


## Sadie Rose Foundation

A foster parent provides the care, love and guidance a child needs- at a time **when the child's family cannot**. It is not always easy being a foster parent, but being committed **to doing what's best for the child** helps ensure success. Foster care placements are not always permanent (though

emotional attachments may last a long time). Plans are made for the **child's permanent care** while the child is in foster care. Foster children come from all backgrounds; there is no **"typical foster child."** Basic requirements for foster parents: must be 18 or older, stable family relationships, financially able to support your family, enough room in your home for a foster

child. Foster Parent Training classes will begin in July.
