Have you seen it? The red wall displaying 200 envelopes with dollar amounts on them? It is part of the Finance Team's plan to acquire the funds to pay down the outstanding loan balance on the Activities Building, refinance and secure a fixed interest rate.

Since its completion, our Activities Building has become a community gathering place. It functions as an outreach and hospitality space, a school and home for several other civic and youth organizations. For our church family it has hosted so many celebrations and goodbyes, special worship experiences, fundraisers and a little 'dancing with the stars.' We are richly blessed with a facility in which to grow in God's love and share it with others.

Here are points to ponder as you consider what commitment you can make:

- The loan balance on April 1 was \$1,106,626.00
- On February 1 the interest rate increased from 4.00% to 4.75%
- Our debt requirement (principal & interest) for 2018 is \$99,660; one-third of our total budget.
- We will lose rental income when Blue Ridge Christian School moves this June
- Our operating budget for 2018 is \$358,000.

How do we use the Wall? Pick an envelope, enclose the amount indicated on that envelope and insert it in the slot. When every envelope is taken, we will have raised \$201,000! Envelopes may be obtained at church on Sundays or anytime during church office hours. Another option is to call the financial secretary, Mary Beth Morris, and request that she pull an envelope of your choosing off the wall and mail it to you.

Please, prayerfully evaluate what you can share but we ask one thing: that your gifts be over and above your regular giving. We still need to be able fund our budget and steady giving helps us to avoid shortfalls.

Everything we have is a gift from the Lord. In Second Corinthians 9:7, Paul writes: "Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion for God loves a cheerful giver."





My increased absence during the week was difficult for me to deal with, but all our volunteers carried the extra load, recognizing this need and joyfully supporting the added responsibilities. I can't thank Dayton UMC and all our Open Doors volunteers enough! Lives were changed this week; providing a wonderful illustration of membership in Christ's family.

Missionary Minute with Mary Beth & Bobby Morris

Several years ago, Mary Beth and I made our first of many trips to the dumps of Teculetan. It remains one of the most heart-wrenching places that I have visited in Guatemala or elsewhere. On that initial trip to the dump, our impending approach became obvious. I was already struck by the poverty that was evident in this third world country, but as our bus turned off the main corridor and down that dusty dirt road, the definition of poverty escalated to a whole new level. The first set of homes that we approached were devised of cinder block and tin. As we continued towards our destination these make-shift block homes seemed to evolve into houses made of mud. It was apparently clear, that the residents who lived down this narrow dirt road understood that the bus that passed by their homes contained American missionaries. Our mere presence seemed to generate an air of excitement or so I thought. Children who were once playing in the street suddenly stopped. Women ceased doing laundry and darted in their homes only to reappear a moment later carrying empty bottles and small plastic bowls. Peering out the back window of the bus, I realized that we were being followed.

Smoke rising from burning garbage will be the first thing you will notice upon arriving at the dump. Children who had previously been playing in or around the smoldering trash rushed to join the ones who had followed us. I had assumed they were there to greet us, but I had failed to see the line that was already forming in the makeshift pavilion adjacent to where our bus had come to a stop. It was Wednesday, one of the three days that this feeding station would provide a meal and we were there to serve it.

Guatemala remains one of the poorest countries in the Western Hemisphere; nearly sixty percent of the population lives below the poverty line and twenty five percent live in extreme poverty. Pastora is one of those individuals. Living in a make-shift plastic shack at the edge of the dump, she helps to support



her family, earning less than a dollar a day, sifting through the garbage for anything recyclable. The three meals served each week by Hope of Life will be her only hot meals of the week. During the nine trips we have made to Guatemala and the Teculetan dump, we have come to love Pastora. One of her most remarkable aspects is not her age (she is in her late seventies) but her infectious smile and cheerful personality. We once asked her, how she could be so happy living in a garbage dump? She smiled and replied, "How could I not be happy because Jesus lives in my heart."

During the first week of July, we will once again be returning to Guatemala and the dump in Teculetan. We will be taking with us suitcases full of shoes. Many of the people that live in and around the dump, including the children, are barefooted. Those that do

have shoes have usually found them while sifting through the garbage. Along with a pair of shoes, it is our plan to provide each person with a water bottle. Several years ago, another missionary team installed a clean water well in the small village adjacent to the dump, their only containers are the plastic bottles they have retrieved from



the landfill. During the summer months, the temperature in Teculetan can surpass 110 degrees and so hydration becomes paramount. This past November, we planted the first of what we hope to be many trees amongst the make-shift homes at the edge of the landfill. There are very few trees near the Teculetan dump, so we hope the one coconut tree, two mango trees and others we plan to plant this July will provide a dual purpose; a source of shade and a supply of fruit.

As mentioned previously, this July Mary Beth and I will be making our tenth trip to this impoverished country. On our first trip, in 2015, we were a part of a team that built a church in the mountainous village of La Colonia. It remains the only church in this village of several hundred people. There is spiritual hunger in this village that has only intensified since the construction of that church. On each of our successive visits to Guatemala, we have returned to this village to conduct a three day Bible study. Mary Beth leads the women's study and I lead the men's study. In that first year, only two men showed up for the men's group. This past November over twenty men gathered to worship the Lord, several accepting Christ as their Savior for the first time. During those early Bible studies, we were astonished to learn that only one man owned a Bible, throughout the past two years, Mary Beth and I have personally provided each newcomer with their very own copy of Scripture.

In the past two years, we have had the unique experience of being with a mission team in village of Arenales. This Mayan village is located in the remote Petén Jungle of northern Guatemala. Malnutrition and other medical conditions were rampant in this village mainly due to their lack of clean drinking water. In 2016, our team dug a well which serves as the only source of clean drinking water for this village of eight hundred Mayan Indians. In 2017, we returned to this village with a doctor and several nurses.

One of our favorite places to visit in Guatemala is the *Hope of Life* missionary complex in Rio Hondo.

It is here that we find the orphanage, baby rescue hospital, senior citizen home and a special needs facility. If international adoptions were still open in Guatemala, then Olga, Raquel and Nelson would already be home with us. At nine years old, Olga is the oldest of her three siblings. She was brought to the orphanage several years

ago, malnourished and 'skin and bones'. All three siblings are the children of a mentally disabled mom and the product of rape. At six years old, Olga's father would remove her from the orphanage long enough to work the harvest in the cantaloupe fields. At the end of harvest season he would return her to the orphanage, malnourished and weak. Only in the past several years has legal action finally ended this cycle of abuse. We have spent countless hours, laying on the floor coloring, playing games or simply hugging and loving these three children. Their story however is not unique, there are many more kids in this orphanage who have experienced similar or worse struggles.

In Guatemala there is no Social Security, pension plan or welfare. If you are lucky enough to have made it to this age in Guatemala family is very important for survival. For those that have no family or whose family is too impoverished to provide support there is very little hope for survival. The senior citizen home on the Hope of Life complex has provided a place of refuge and hope for some of those individuals. They have not only survived poverty, but endured the thirty years of civil war that plagued Guatemala from 1966 to 1996. Although the language barrier is an obstacle it does not prevent the fellowship we share with these individuals. I have spent

hours, listening to Miriam tell stories that I cannot understand. At eighty years old and without family she can barely contain her excitement when we visit. Her farewell words are always the same, "Cristo te ama!" Christ loves you!

There are over seventy seniors that call this center home, most have accepted Christ as their Savior but there are others we are still desperately trying to reach. When we return in July, we hope to present each with a large print Spanish Bible. **

People have often asked me why I travel to Guatemala. The easy answer is that I have fell in love with the people of this country. They may be living in one of the most impoverished countries in the world but their eagerness and desire to know the

Lord is unquestionable. In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus instructs us, "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." (Matthew 28:19, NIV). I often tell people, "I traveled to the Holy Land to walk in the footsteps of Jesus, I go to Guatemala to be in His presence."



Thank you for this opportunity to share with you about our mission work in Guatemala and our love for the people there. Please remember us in your prayers as we prepare for the trip in July and for the time while there.

♦ Only 24-count boxes, please.

•1 14x16 inch cloth bag **

♦ Homemade or purchased bags are both acceptable;

♦ Heavy-duty fabric only, such as denim, corduroy, drapery fabric, etc.;

♦ Closures are optional but must be buttons, snaps, or Velcro sewn in middle of opening, if used.
