A Note from Your Finance Committee, Trustees and Council:

We've been working to find solutions to our financial challenges and want to share an update:

- As of August 31, only \$3,275 in checking accounts.
- \$35,000 has been taken out of the Trustees Emergency Fund (the Trustees Emergency Fund was established by former estate gifts) to pay bills this calendar year.
- We must lower our monthly mortgage obligations to balance our budget. As of August 31st, our year-to-date expenditures are in excess of our income by \$39,000.
- Finance is communicating with banks to find the best interest rate for the longest period of time to refinance our loan in order to reduce monthly payments and free up money to cover ministry and operating expenses.

We will have another congregational meeting on Sunday, October 21st. Everyone, please stay after worship to discuss options/plans to raise funds and reduce our debt.

NEEDED: COMMITTED SUPPORTERS

Our church family is very generous. Every year our church supports over 90% of our budgeted operating expenses, and gives tens of thousands in additional mission giving both here locally and beyond through disaster relief and United Methodist missions. There is ALWAYS a generous response to every important need that arises.

Giving comes from three sources: envelopes, loose plate (cash/checks), and eGiving. Annual envelope giving and eGiving totals have remained steady and have not decreased over the last five years. Loose plate giving, which is over half of total giving, has steadily dropped over the same period. And this decrease has caused a shortfall in meeting the budget every year. This has necessitated dipping into our reserves every year to make up the difference resulting in a large reduction in our available reserves.

Loose plate contributions consistently follow worship attendance; when attendance is up, this giving is up and vice versa. **Your church very much needs your help. It will significantly increase the support of our church's ongoing week in, week out life and ministry, if our loose plate giving becomes regular and consistent. Please consider becoming a regular weekly/monthly contributor whether you are able to be in church on Sunday or not. Envelopes and eGiving are helpful tools. Or consider adding your desired support to your monthly budget and mailing the gift to the church.**

We are grateful to God for everyone's generous support. Your church cannot make a real and eternal difference in people's lives without your support and participation.

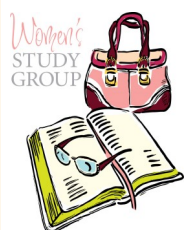

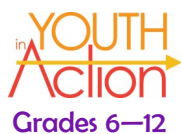
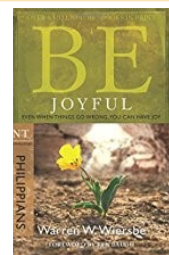

Dayton United Methodist Church has been holding services in this present building for 40 years. Here are some interesting notes about the two churches that came together ten years earlier in 1968 to form the Dayton United Methodist Church.

The Methodist Church of Dayton, VA

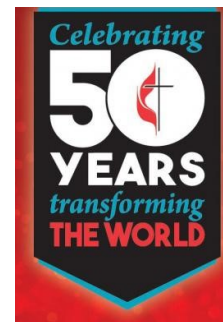
- ✚ A structure was built in 1851 in Dayton that was used by the Lutherans, the United Brethren, and the Methodists.
- ✚ In 1888 the Methodist Church purchased an unused school building from Rockingham County to meet and worship in.
- ✚ In 1898 the church purchased a lot on Mill Street (across from present day Blue Ridge Christian High School) for \$100.⁰⁰. The church was built and had opening services in April 1899. Remodeling was done in 1924 and improvements made in 1948. In 1948 a fund was started to erect an educational building and social hall.
- ✚ In 1918 the pastor's salary was \$1,000. Being part of a charge, Dayton's share was \$173.77. Figures were given that \$75.00 had been paid through three quarters, so the church owed a balance of \$98.77 for the fourth quarter. (*Some things don't change!*) In 1919 the envelope system for raising Church funds was adopted and the pastor began receiving a check each time he preached.
- ✚ In 1949 the membership was reported as 139.

The Evangelical United Brethren Church of Dayton, VA

- ✚ In 1878, the United Brethren constructed their own place of worship. This building was destroyed by fire in 1903. Another building was constructed and dedicated in 1904 at a cost of \$6,100. (That building is located on Main Street and is used by a Lutheran congregation.)
- ✚ When the Shenandoah College and Conservatory of Music was located in Dayton from 1875 to 1960, it was associated closely with the United Brethren Church (later E.U.B.) This school of higher education held many functions and practices at the church and the college choir enriched the worship services.
- ✚ In 1946, the Church of the United Brethren in Christ and the Evangelical Church denominations were united and was known as the Evangelical United Brethren Church or E.U.B.'s, and the Dayton United Brethren Church became known as the Dayton Evangelical United Brethren Church.
- ✚ Music is a big part of this church's history. The church owned an organ which had to be pumped by hand and that organ was later moved to the college. In 1899 a Story & Clark organ was purchased for \$78.00. A new pipe organ was purchased in 1908 for \$1,100. That organ was replaced in 1926 by the four-manual Mohler pipe organ which is still being used by the Lutheran congregation.
- ✚ It is interesting to note that in 1915-1916 a woman, Miss Ida Judy, served the church (as pastor) with Rev. A. S. Hammack. She was ordained as an elder in 1901.
- ✚ In the early 1900's youth societies were encouraged, and the first young people's society of the Dayton Church was organized.

The Merger

- ✚ In the 1960's a committee of six persons, three from the E.U.B Church and three from the Methodist Church was formed to study the possibly of merging the two congregations in Dayton.
- ✚ On June 2, 1968, the two congregations joined together for the first worship service held at the Main Street E.U.B. Church.
- ✚ At the time of the merger, the E.U.B. church reported 163 members and the Methodist Church had 227. At the end of 1969 membership of Dayton UMC was reported as 431.
- ✚ The present building was built in 1978. The indebtedness at the time was \$175,000. There is a detailed account of the merger and construction of the present building written by Carr Coffman which contains very interesting information.
- ✚ Twenty years later the present parsonage was dedicated.
- ✚ The activities building was dedicated on October 11, 2009.

Pastor's Charge Conference Report For 2018 By Rev. Bruce Carper

As I enter my third year as pastor, I am encouraged at the progress DUMC is making growing disciples of Jesus Christ. The details of the N.O.W.W. ministries are included in the "other reports". Here are some important highlights:

Nurture: this year three small groups began weekly meetings in neighborhood homes. We plan to start two more this fall.

- this fall we are re-structuring our children's Sunday school using a mini-VBS model.
- three of our five adult Sunday classes are using small group video curriculum from RightNow Media.
- the 75 copies of the Upper Room disappear with each issue.

Outreach: this year we became a GBOGM Covenant Partner with missionary Clara Biswas (Cambodia) who visited our church June 26 – 28.

- VBS each year reaches 60-80 children, many of which come from our community.
- Young First Followers children's ministry meets twice monthly and is attracting new neighborhood children.
- our Jr. and Sr. High Youth groups go on summer mission trips every year and are also very active locally.
- 50-80 residents attend our winter weekly Community Dinners.
- we host the Open Doors homeless for two weeks every season.

Worship: we have four very gifted music staff who lead our Adult Choir, Bell Choir, Praise Team, and Children's Choir.

- our AV Team is launching a new video system to live stream worship and post on Facebook.
- our Worship Team faithfully organizes Ushers, AV Team, children acolyte/readers, Greeters, and Nursery Ministry.

Witness: Coffee Fellowship meet and greet time happens every week between Worship and Sunday School.

- Worship guests receive a church coffee mug, visitor packet, church cookbook, and follow-up letter. Return guests receive a porch visit and call from pastor.
- we had two special services with evangelists Greg West and Steve Wingfield.

Administrative Ministries

Our **Church Council** was re-structured January 2017 to be an envisioning, implementing, evaluating Team that would discern God's vision, develop a blueprint for making disciples, and re-purpose each ministry to set goals "so that" disciples would be made. Next year the Council will be fully constituted with six new leaders!

The **Finance Team** has met often and worked diligently utilizing outside financial counselors to address the need to pay down the principle on the mortgage loan in order to bring our operating budget to a manageable level, to acquire a fixed rate and term mortgage, and to increase consistent congregational support. The Team also developed and implemented an Endowment Plan.

The **Trustees** continue to maintain our grounds and facilities in very attractive and mechanically excellent condition.

Nominations and Leadership Development: we are seeing additional members, more younger members, serving in leadership and ministry roles.

SPRC: we are blessed with excellent administrative, music, and custodial staff.

Pastor: our future is bright because God is leading us there. Our leaders and church family are seeking to be faithful and fruitful in these and new ways as we continue to grow into more fully devoted disciples of Jesus Christ.

Located at 1704 Smithland Road in Harrisonburg it serves needy children with free clothing and loans medical equipment to folks that can't afford new.

They have answered God’s call to serve our community in the name of Christ with determination and gusto. We are in the process of getting water and plumbing to complete the Center. Mission Central belongs to all of our churches and it will be amazing as we work together to see where God leads us. Blessings to all who have made this Center a reality. Come and see what God has done!”

The Children’s Clothes Closet is open to the public on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays from 10:00 -1:00 and the 2nd and 4th Thursdays from 5:00 -7:00. All other Wednesday mornings are work days sorting, tagging, and preparing for open days. **NOTE: There is a ‘crib’ in the narthex of DUMC** for donations of new and gently used items for newborns to teenagers (so for some, adult sizes are needed). They serve several hundred children each month and there is always shortage of teen clothing.

The Medical Equipment for Caring Loaner Closet is open to the public Mondays, 9:00 -12 Noon and Thursdays, 5:00 -7:00. “We are still accepting donations of equipment and supplies as we continue to give these to those needing them. Our medical equipment includes walkers, wheelchairs, bedside commodes, shower benches, hospital beds, Hoyer lifts and over the bed trapeze bars. We deliver and set up hospital beds if these are needed. We also have disposables such as dressings, wound care supplies, disposable briefs and diapers. We need volunteers to help keep our loaner closet open and to clean and organize the equipment, and organize the disposables. We also need strong persons to help the bed delivery group. 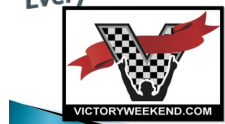
