

The Council of Bishops has called a Special Session of the General Conference of The United Methodist Church to be held February 23-26, 2019, at The Dome,

part of the America's Center Convention Complex in St. Louis, Missouri. The purpose will be to act on a report from the Council of Bishops based on the recommendations of the Commission on a Way Forward. The 32-member Commission was appointed to examine in The Book of Discipline concerning human sexuality and exploring options to strengthen the unity of the church.

Summary of Plans developed by the Commission on a Way over a two year collaborative study to represent all the diverse views within the worldwide denomination. These are a summary of the plans recommended by the Commission to the 2019 Special General Conference. The complete plan documents are available on links at vaumc.org

#### **One Church Plan**

Affirms sexual relations only within the covenant of monogamous marriage between two adults (thereby permitting homosexual marriage)

Declares we are not of one mind regarding human sexuality and permits persons in the church to interpret and decide issues of human sexuality differently

Permits pastors to bless monogamous homosexual marriages anywhere secular law permits such marriages

Removes restrictive language from the Book of Discipline that prohibits same-gender weddings at UMC properties and ordination of "self-avowed practicing homosexuals"

Does not require churches or conferences to accept such practices and contains language to protect consciences of pastors and congregations

#### **Connectional Conference Plan**

Replaces current five U.S. jurisdictional conference with three connectional conferences based on agreement on issues related to the definition of marriage and ordination standards – Progressive, Unity, and Traditional

All three would use a general Book of Discipline (Articles of Religion, General Rules, Confession of Faith) with the ability to adapt other portions to their context of ministry

Provides space for different practices and beliefs by the different connectional conferences

Requires numerous Constitutional Amendments

### "Modified" Traditional Plan

Retains the church's current position on the practice of homosexuality, enhances accountability, and provides a gracious exit path for annual conferences, local churches, and clergy who cannot abide by the requirements of the Book of Discipline into a new self-governing Methodist church

#### Prayer for Special General Conference February 23-26

Let us pray: Oh Lord, we come to offer our praise and thanksgiving for your presence and gifts, your mercy and grace. We come to ask for strength and courage as we pray for our General Conference, for the delegates and for your United Methodist Church. We pray Lord, hold your delegates in the palm of your hand. Give them wisdom, compassion and understanding and a willingness to make difficult and necessary decisions to strengthen and grow your church as we walk this journey together. We acknowledge Lord that we are a diverse people, of different cultures, understandings, biases, beliefs and desires. Instill in us a sense of the Body of Christ, that we may in our differences be one Body of Christ. Where there is division, lead us to compromise and unity and maintain our focus on your mission that you have for us in the world, to make disciples in relationship with you.

"Give all delegates a love for your church – a desire not only to serve you as we now can but also a determination to bring unity to divided churches, that the world may more readily receive the Gospel and find in our manner of living it out the way of peace and unity. Through Christ who is the head of the body, the church. Amen."

When Philip Johnson, renowned architect and designer of the Crystal Cathedral in California, was just 13, his family took him to France. When they entered the cathedral at Chartres, Philip was so moved by the majesty and beauty of the build-

ing dedicated to God that he burst into tears.

I have also shed tears in a church. I wept when I felt the nudging presence of God pointing me toward the ministry. I wept when I was ordained. I wept when I retired after serving as a pastor for 38 years.

I have seen people weep at the altar rail. I have seen brides cry during the marriage ceremony. I have observed people weeping at funerals and sometimes at the baptism of a child. I recall a man saying to me, "I cried during the sermon. Do you know that what you preach can sometimes make a person cry?"

To weep before God is to be in good company. Job said, "My eye pours out tears to God" (Job 16:20, NRSV). A psalmist prayed, "Hear my prayer, O Lord, and give ear to my cry; do not hold your peace at my tears" (Psalm 39:12, NRSV). Read Jeremiah 9 and you will understand why he is called "the weeping prophet."

Jesus wept over the wretched status of Jerusalem where he was spurned (Luke 19:41). He also wept when his friend Lazarus died (John 11:35). St. Paul wrote to the Corinthians, "I wrote you out of much distress and anguish of heart and with many tears" (2 Corinthians 2:4, NRSV).

The point is this: When you are moved to cry before God, cry. People with caring hearts do that.

LOVE IN ACTION: Fiddler on the Roof, the 1964 musical about an Orthodox Jewish family navigating cultural change, includes a duet by the main character, Tevye, and his wife, Golde. As they watch their daughters marry for love, they contemplate their own arranged marriage.

"Do you love me?" Tevye sings. After first deflecting the question, Golde recounts the many things she's done for or with him during 25 years together — cooked, cleaned, endured hardships, raised a family. She concludes, "If that's not love, what is?"

When Jesus speaks of love, he uses a word that might be better translated as "serve." Above all, love is an action. Sometimes we feel loving; sometimes not. But Jesus calls us always to act lovingly. And in the end, serving is the best way to show our love.

If that's not love, what is?


