Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Recently, I came across a commercial from Godaddy called "Open We Stand." You can follow the link at: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=DsSQos5Qi6Y I hope you get the opportunity to watch this video, but in the meantime let me paraphrase the words. "Open! Do you remember having that feeling for the first time, the first Sunday you preached in a church? The first Sunday you were greeted by your new parishioners? The first Church Council meeting you had? The first confirmation class you taught, the first visitation you had in the hospital, the first baptism of a baby, the first new member received in the church you served, the first wedding, the first funeral? Open, do you remember the night before you open? Who could ever sleep. . . Open. But there is a different question we are asking now, are you going to remain open even when the doors of our churches are closed? Open, that is how we show who we are, and there is another way to be open, to pull together or push depending on the door and we are making it work, and we will continue to make it work, together because open we stand."

I have to confess to you that these past few weeks have been somewhat difficult. I am sure some of you can relate to that. Sometimes I wake up thinking that the nightmare is now over. I wake up thinking that it was all but a bad dream, and I am ready to return to the ways things were before. I simply wake up hoping that everything will come back to normal or at least the way I thought it was normal. But, what is normal anyway?

I have often said: "The church has left the building." Perhaps normal was to have an inward focus of church. Perhaps normal was to take care of our own first, before we extended our hands to those in need. Perhaps normal has been making members, instead of making disciples of Jesus Christ. Perhaps normal was to remain within the four walls of the church buildings. Perhaps, normal was trying to control the Holy Spirit! How naïve! Trying to control the Holy Spirit?

The church has left the building! And now the "normal" is changing before our very eyes. Paul reminds the Philippians: "Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice!:" Paul is telling us to always rejoice.

Perhaps normal has been allowing fear to take over. Paul also reminds to the Philippians: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation. . .see Paul reminds us that in EVERY situation and that includes this COVID-19 by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God." I think fear many times is our worst enemy, and I am right there as I have fear. We face fear almost every day! But Paul reminds us "Do not be anxious about anything."



God places the best things in life on the other side of fear. Paul says: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

The question isn't can you handle the situation. Can you handle being on the other side of fear? The question is, can you handle your mind? Can you manage the thoughts and the emotions that are trying to poison your progress? Forget managing the situation, manage your mind. Training your mind to sit calmly where the fears are present and give them to God. "Do not be anxious about anything." And Finally, says Paul. .



"RELAUNCH TO GLORY!

My Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Under the current social distancing requirements in the Commonwealth of Virginia and the guidance of Bishop Lewis our churches are shuttered, all events are cancelled, schools are closed with home schooling in its stead. . . I could go on. . .but why bother. . .you know what's going on. . .we are quarantined for the foreseeable future. From what I have seen, the pastors, staff, and congregations are doing a great job adapting to the strangeness of ministry in this new wilderness. We are finding new ways to do church. Great! But are we ready for whatever comes next?

What does come next? I attended a Virginia Conference meeting of developers like me (on Zoom, of course) on April 21st. The guest speaker, Rev. Paul Nixon, was discussing the re-launch of our churches following the "all clear". He borrowed a quote from Tony Campolo who said if 1955 comes back, we in the church will be ready. Instead Rev. Nixon offered, "If 2019 comes back after the pandemic we are ready. But it's not coming back." We are in the middle of a reinvention of the church forced on us by this pandemic. And to further aggravate the situation, we are faced with pending social upheaval within the church and a forecasted 2nd and 3rd wave of this pandemic. We are not going back. So what do we do to ready the church?



I am certainly not the soothsayer that can predict and counsel the church on a new way forward, but I can report what I see. There has been a lot of good regarding the church in isolation. We are communicating using the technical gifts of society. Some would say we are getting closer, because it is not just a Sunday morning worship in the Sanctuary, but rather a presence in each of our homes, reaching out to each other, sharing needs and concern. But we still haven't answered the question, "what's tomorrow look like?"

That is anyone's guess. We are spending a lot of brain power and prayer time trying to figure it out. And it is difference for every church, small/medium/large, urban/small town/rural, progressive/moderate/conservative/traditional/contemporary or any combination of the aforementioned.

I truly believe this transition is an opportunity to break the mold on doing church, to free our ministry from the constraints that are holding us back in this changing world: the limitations of a building-based ministry, using modern means to connect with each other, look after each other as an expanded community, broaden our local mission orientation, touch those who would never set foot in the church and offer them a home in Jesus Christ, and reach out into neighborhoods to identify the true needs of the community.

When I read all these (and I am sure there are many more), and I see WITNESS. . . witnessing the Good News to those who are in such dire need, witnessing to our brothers and sisters to build fellowship, witnessing in our prayer and study groups, witnessing the love of Christ throughout our communities. This witnessing of God, and for God, and with God during this time of abject poverty of the soul, this time of grief and loss, can re-launch a realigned church focused on the future, a future of prosperity and growth with new tools to match the times ahead. This pandemic, as tragic and heartbreaking as it is, could rebirth the church as last seen in the days of Luther's *Reformation* or Whitfield's *Great Awakening*.

My Brothers and Sisters, it is not a time for cowering and remorse, but one of hope and passion for the ministry of Jesus Christ here in the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia and around the world. In these perilous times if our churches in the Harrisonburg District but witness to the truth that Christ is risen, Jesus is Lord, can anyone or anything deny us as we re-launch to Glory? So Be It.



May 6 - May 26	(21 - day plan)	Fruits of the Spirit: Peace
May 27 - June 16	(21 - day plan)	Fruits of the Spirit: Patience
June 17 - July 7	(21 - day plan)	Fruits of the Spirit: Kindness
July 8 - July 28	(21 - day plan)	Fruits of the Spirit: Goodness
July 29 - August 18	(21 - day plan)	Fruits of the Spirit: Faithfulness
August 19 - September 8	(21 - day plan)	Fruits of the Spirit: Gentleness
September 9 - September 29	(21 - day plan)	Fruits of the Spirit: Self-Control
September 30 - October 20	(21 - day plan)	Trust
October 21 - November 10	(21 - day plan)	Mercy
November 11 - December 1	(21 - day plan)	Bearing Fruit
December 2 - December 23	(21 - day plan)	Cares of the World
December 24 - January 13	(21 - day plan)	Rest

There are 18 plans to cover this year. Each is 21 days long. Start at the beginning and work through the year (and a few days into January 2021). In this new year, challenge yourself to study the Bible and strengthen your faith in the process.

Tips on reading the Bible daily:

- Start reading the Bible today.
- Set aside a specific time and place each day. Set your schedule and then stick to it. Mornings are great, but feel free to use any time that works consistently in your schedule.
- Get a good study Bible to help illuminate the meaning of the original Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek text
- Choose a translation to use during your reading.
- Say a short prayer to God before you begin, asking the Holy Spirit to give you wisdom and understanding.
- Dive in and enjoy the richness of God's Word! Apply God's Word to your life. Bible study should be practiced and applicable. These seven steps will help you begin a journey to becoming a "lifelong learner" of God's Word.

Information on the CARES Act: Financial Relief for Nonprofits - Small Business Administration (SBA) 7a Forgivable Loans for Nonprofits provides funding for special emergency loans up to \$10 million for eligible nonprofits to cover payroll, operations, debt services, etc. Loans can cover payroll and assorted costs, health insurance premiums, facilities cost, and debt service. The loans have a maximum interest rate of 4% and are available as an incentive for employers to hire back as many workers as is feasible. Authorizes administration of new loans until December 31, 2020. Provides lenders authority to make determinations on a borrower's eligibility and creditworthiness without going through all of SBA's regular channels. Eligible borrows need to make a good faith

certification that the loan is necessary due to the uncertainty of the current economic conditions caused by COVID 19. Loans can be forgiven, in whole, for organizations that maintain employment from March 1 - June 30, 2020, essentially turning the loan into a grant. If your church or UMC affiliated organization wants to participate in the SBA's Paycheck Protection Program (PPP), but has not applied yet or has not found an institution willing or able to assist you, please contact the The United Methodist Credit Union. If you are not already a member, you can quickly become one and apply for this program using an online application. If you have an urgent need, TUMCU can also help your church or organization with a low -interest bridge loan or a line of credit while you await SBA funding. The <u>Southeastern Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church announced on April 6 that the decision has been made to postpone all 2020 US Jurisdictional conferences scheduled for July</u>. According to the Book of Discipline, all Jurisdictional Conference occur simultaneously on a date set by the Council of Bishops. As soon as the dates for the rescheduled General Conference are released, the Council of Bishops will set a new date for the opening of the Jurisdictional Conferences.



GENERAL CONFERENCE TO MOVE TO 2021: Subsequent to the announcement by the Executive Committee on the Commission on the General Conference that the 2020 General Conference will be postponed, the full Commission met March 21, 2020, to determine next steps to take in setting a new date. After hearing recommendations from Sara Hotchkiss, Business Manager of the General Conference, and discussion of possible alternatives, the Commission made a determination that the General Conference will not meet in 2020 as originally planned and elected to work toward setting a date in 2021. The Commission resolved that holding the event in Minneapolis is a high priority and authorized the business office to pursue other dates available at the Minneapolis Convention Center in 2021. Once new dates for the General Conference are set and adjustments

with current vendors are made, additional information will be sent out to delegations regarding a timeline and next steps.

Spiritual Food For Thought

All four Gospel accounts depict Mary Magdalene (and others) going to the tomb where Jesus was buried the morning after the Jewish Sabbath to anoint His body with burial spices. Instead of a body to anoint, they encountered angels, Roman soldiers who appeared to be dead, an earthquake and our Risen Lord. What they saw and experienced was definitely not what they were looking for!

I think we can assume they had absolutely no reference point with which to view the events they experienced that first Easter morning. Currently, we are in the midst of a series of events and situations that most of us probably have no frame of reference for either. This begs the question, "What are we looking for during this pandemic?" Paul in his letter to the Colossians has some excellent advice for all of us, "Since, then you have been raised with Christ, set your heart on things above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God." (Colossians 3:1, NIV)

As I have grown older, and hopefully wiser, one of the first things I try to ask myself is, "Lord, what can I learn from what I have experienced?" One thing my Christian Walk has taught me is that if I am not listening, God will get my attention. I don't know about anyone else, but God has my attention now. Kathy and I are living very quiet, secluded lives. We have a lot of spare time on our hands. My devotions take longer each day. There are several craft projects each of us are doing. There is definitely nothing on our calendars to hustle out the door for. I've also found that calling someone on the phone and talking is more fulfilling than a text or an email. Who would have thought?

God changes our lives as He opens our ears, awakens our attention, and we respond...

one day at a time.

This can be a wake-up call for all of us. What is really important in our lives? We worship a transactional God—He wants a relationship with us. Maybe we can also make deeper, more substantive relationships with our family, friends and whoever we interact with a priority. There are a few things in life as satisfying as a human interaction that leaves us feeling better when it is done. During these uncertain times, I challenge each one of us (myself included) to rekindle a relationship that may have grown stale. Remember, we may be the only image of Christ that others will see today. (Upper Room Devotion, April 14, 2020)

Work humbly with God; walk gently with your neighbor, and be at peace with yourself.
